ABOUT FOUNDER

Late Shikshan Maharshi Dnyandeo Mohekar (Guruji)

There are leaders who mesmerize listeners with their masterly oratory skills. Such leaders raise expectations but some fail to fulfill them. Then there are leaders who have practical vision for the society. Late Shikshan Maharshi Dnyandeo Mohekar Guruji was the one among them.

Late Mohekar Guruji, a freedom fighter, bachelor of agriculture, a devoted social worker had to struggle due to the lack of educational facilities since his childhood. Being rootless, he decided to work for rural development. He realized that education was the base of social development. He was honest lover of education and social development. He was an intellectual with a heightened awareness of human problems in rural area.

Late Mohekar Guruji was born in a very remote place named 'Dahitna' in Kaij Taluka, at his maternal house. His native place was Moha, in Osmanabad District. He was from a farmer's family. His father and other elderly members were illiterate. His mother, with the hope that her child should not remain illiterate, he must study and learn to read spiritual books, sent him to his maternal uncle, as there was no school at Moha. It was the last meeting of the mother and the son as she died of plague at Moha leaving him orphan at Dahitna at his age of 2.5 years with a younger sister.

Mohekar Guruji's uncle was a teacher in private school, who taught him primary Marathi language. There was no government school nearby. When he was eight years' old, he had to move at least two to three towns to learn the subjects like Mathematics, Urdu and English. He started learning English at Naholi, a village near Dahitna. Education for him, was becoming a very difficult

task day by day. Eight year's hungry Dnyandehad to move from place to place to get knowledge. But the thirst to get education was something beyond imagination.

Anyhow, he passed his matriculation from Aurangabad centre, and joined city Science College, Hyderabad. His further education was assisted by various scholarships. Stay at Hyderabad made a drastic change in his life. Crises and problems were no habitual to him. The little lad with search for hope in the dark was turning into an ambitious youth. There he came in contact with varieties of people, Hindu and Muslims busy with the activities relating to freedom struggle. He also tried to publish a periodical in Marathi during his college days. Probably he was the first person in Marathwada, who run adult education scheme. In the years 1948-49 there were at least 10 to 12 adult education centres in Moha. He also participated in anti Razakar Movement.

In 1950 he returned to Moha. Though there were the golden chances for him to get a government job, or going abroad for further studies, he established the institution named Dnyan Prasarak Mandal with the sheet objective of spreading education in the masses. The institution has an apt moto 'Knowledge for all'. Education to the doorstep, in keeping with the principle one of his first action was to open a school at Moha in June 1951, named Dnyan Prasar Vidyalaya. Indirectly he turned to cooperative movement. At the same time he became the Mayor of Moha. Faced with the financial crises that crippled development work in rural area, he launched austerity measures. His contemporary teachers, friends, people in his village gave him the hand of co-operation.

Now, that the people came to know that their little co-operation is doing massive change in the educational atmosphere of the area, little wonder is becoming the key to social harmony. India become independent in 1947, but the

youth of Osmanabad district started enjoying its fruits only after the efforts of Mohekar Guruji. He retired as a headmaster. Upto the end of his life he was actively careful for the progress of Dnyan Prasarak Mandal as a founder member and secretary. Today the institution is largely active in Kalamb, Paranda, AUSA and Latur areas.

We are proud to note that the institution today runs a senior college names 'Shikshan Maharshi Dnyandeo Mohekar Mahavidyalaya', which was previously named as Dnyan Prasarak Mahavidyalaya. It was opened in June 1969. There are four junior colleges at Kalamb, Moha, Matola, and Yermala. The institution also runs ten high schools, one primary school and four hostels for backward class students.

Apart from this Late Mohekar Guruji also worked as a member and Director of various co-operative societies, co-operative oil mill at Yermala, Hostels of Maharashtra State Education Federation, Marathwada Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Aurangabad, Academic Council and Senate of Marathwada University, Aurangabad. He was also actively working as a journalist, and published a weekly named 'Pawan-Jyot'.

Such a personality, gave further to the youth, confidence to the peasants. He skillfully and effectively dealt with the aim and ambition. His vision for future entails modernization but not a blind imitation of other institutions. He believed in development through people's participation and came up with the new concept of membership to employees in society. He also took the initiative to discuss and negotiate with other members and colleagues for the speedy development of each branch of the institution.

His vision and services to the society were duly rewarded when he got Janseva Award of Rajmati Nemgonda Patil Trust, Sangli in 1990. Not only this

but his work in educational field made people to know him as Shikshan Maharshi.

The spirit of the youth, the future of the villagers, the trust of the teachers, the friends the true member of the society, the ray of hope of children left this mortal world on 30th August 1991, leaving all his efforts to be carried forward by his successors.

About the College

With the view to give wide scope to the students in rural area of Osmanabad District in Dnyan Prasarak Mandal opened senior college at Kalamb in 1969. Running a college without any economic source was a challenge before the institution. But with the help and moral inspiration of the supporters it could accept the challenge. When the college was in its initial stage, there were only arts and commerce faculties. But these two faculties created a ray of hope in the minds of the matriculate students who had to go to Aurangabad for further education. It was rather expensive for the rural students. For the overall development of the students the college started N.S.S. and N.C.C. There was cultural department also which enabled the students to show the power of their activities in social welfare, interest in drama, street plays, songs and varieties of other activities. The sports department, since the beginning is careful towards the mental and physical health of the students.

The further step in the development was opening of science faculty in 1982. It gave a golden chance to the rural students to take an opportunity in the field of science to make their career and also help the nation progress scientifically.

Today the college runs 12 institutional programmers, 5 conventional and 7 non-conventional programmers. There are career oriented programmers like Electronics, Computer Science etc. Most of the students in our college come from rural area. Naturally, farming is their traditional source of income, considering this view, and to give support to their traditional trade, the college runs agro based courses like Animal Husbandry and Dairying, Fishery Science, Sericulture, Dry Land Agriculture, Horticulture etc.

Recently, taking in consideration the need of the knowledge of computer the college has operated Net Access Centre and has a linkage with MITCON. It enables the students to appear for the examinations information Technology.

Besides many of the degree courses, the college also runs certificate courses in Dairy Farming, Mulberry Cultivation and Seri-Culture.

At B.A. level, the students can study Physical Education, Military Science as optional subjects. For the overall development of the personality, the students are given the knowledge of remedial English grammar, training in spoken English, during the special campaigns.

The foremost aim of the institution is to produce resourceful persons with entrepreneurial skills as well with the discernment and diligence expected of the people engaged in high-tech systems and research institutes in order to form a nation economically self-reliant, politically stable and culturally impenetrable. Social responsibility is our priority and so we believe more in stake holder friendly educational system. For the maximum accomplishment of the academic goals, the college enriches and improves all the resources constantly. Quality conscious and strong intention for quality sustenance is the aim of education all through the organization. The institution has also started postgraduate center in Zoology, History, Geography and Marathi. Just in the span of 20 years the college stands as a research center in zoology. The institution proudly declares that in the research centre has three research guides and 20 part time students at present. Four students are already awarded Ph.D. The college has 08 Ph.D, and 8 M.Phil degree faculty members. A great number of staff members keep themselves in research activities, publish articles in the journals of international repute and present papers at national level and international level seminars, conferences and symposia.

With the motto Knowledge for all and the objective Higher Education for Excellency, in Rural Technology, the institution Dnyan Prasarak Mandal, Yermala was established in 1951. Development of rural masses is the mission of the institute. The following aims were set to be achieved.

PART A

The Plan of Action chalked out by the IQAC in the beginning of the year towards quality enhancement and the outcome achieved by the end of the year.

Dnyan Prasarak Mandal,

Yermala's Shikshan Maharshi Dnyandeo Mohekar Mahavidyalaya, Kalamb was assessed and Accredited by NAAC on 10th and 11th March 2004 with the Grad B+. The college proposes to undergo the process of post accreditation. For this the college has established the Internal Quality Advisory Committee. The Principal Dr A.D. Mohekar as a Chairman and which includes senior faculty members, administrative staff and local persons as per guidelines, Shri S.N. Wangikar, Lecturer in Chemistry is appointed as a Member Co-ordinator of IQAC.

This committee prepares the annual reports of the year 2004-05 as per guidelines. The IQAC has gone through the weaknesses shown by NAAC peer team and finding the ways to strengthen these weaknesses as highlights of the college. As per criteria wise analyses made by peer team, the college planned in every aspects as per necessity.

Curricular Aspects :

Environmental Science had been introduced as a mandatory subject for B.A., B.Sc., & B.Com courses since last two academic years. In the same way computer literacy programme is also introduced for the same students. It was planned to give free internet access training to the students of the college. The batches are of 10 students. The training is for 10 clock hours. Actually it was for 20 students' batch for 15 clock hours. But due to load shading and time constraint the number of students in each batch is reduced to 10. The course is run at every fortnight. This enables the students to access general knowledge and also knowledge update of their subjects through various websites.

The college also gives training to teaching and non-teaching staff members. To give knowledge of Purchase of advanced computers and computer access the teaching and non-teaching staff is divided into groups of 5-6 members. They are trained before and after office hours at every week end.

Teaching, Learning and Evaluation

For effective teaching and learning, the college has planned the systematic implementation and completion of syllabus, use of teaching aids, use of internet, models, charts etc. The teaching method which is generally lecture method is supported by above said facilities to make the teaching effective. To increase the participation of students, the seminars, group discussions methods are used in English and science subjects.

As per program schedule the faculty members in respective subject and the non-teaching staff are deputed for orientation and refresher courses. Also the faculty members are deputed for participation in seminars, workshops conferences etc.

In the beginning of academic year annual and monthly plan of teaching co-curricular activities is chalked out by each department. A program of test,

tutorials, seminars and examinations is also prepared and is made known to students. The curricular and co-curricular activities are supervised by faculty in charge with the help of vice-principals under guidance of principal. The head of department plans and supervises the departmental activities. Teaching and non-teaching staff maintains a daily teaching diaries and work books, Head of departments check these regularly. Periodical meetings are called by HOD, Faculty in Charge, and the Principal.

To assess and evaluate the students, the unit tests, tutorials, term examination and pre-annual examination are conducted. The more attention is given towards clever students for their up gradation.

To improve the quality of teaching, learning the college proposes to add more innovative methods at UG level with Inter discipline approach. The plan of action is to arrange guest lectures, to organize seminars and workshops, to arrange industrial study and excursion tours and to purchase O.H.P. and L.C.D. and to construct multimedia classroom.

Research, consultancy and extension

To initiate the culture of research the college proposes to undertake various major and minor projects involving faculty members and students. The local problems will be studied under these projects and the advice; consultation will be given to the local community.
